#### **Round Table**

The Mediterranean area is a strategically important region. Linking Europe, Africa and Asia, it is a place of economic, cultural and political exchange. Centered on the Mediterranean Sea, the area encompasses the 21 countries that border it, and is a major crossroads for international security and stability. Indeed, these geostrategic features are accompanied by numerous risks and threats to be curbed: geopolitical tensions brought to bear by local, often non-state actors and/or external powers, obstacles to supply flows, denial of access to resources, migratory flows, terrorism, and so on. Aerospace power's responsiveness, reach, agility and versatility enable it to prevent and intervene in trouble spots, either in complete autonomy or in support of other components. Air and space forces thus have a central role to play in security and defense in the Mediterranean.

#### The Levant and Eastern Mediterranean: a renewed area of interest for regional and global powers



**Moderator : Pierre Razoux** is a doctor habilitated to direct research and the Academic Director of the FMES institute. Prior to joining the FMES, he headed the "Europe/Russia/Mediterranean/Middle East" section at the Institut de Recherche Stratégique de l'Ecole Militaire.



**Dorothée Schmid** is a specialist in Mediterranean and Turkish issues. She is a graduate of Science Po Paris, and holds a PhD in political science from the Université Paris-II Panthéon-Sorbonne.



**Hasan Yükselen** is the Director of Security and Strategic Studies at the Ankara Foreign Policy Institute in Turkey (TFPI), since 2023. He has held many positions, including advisor to the Head of the Intelligence Division at Turkish General Staff Headquarters (2020-2023).



**Marc Semo** is a well-known french journalist working for *Le Monde*. Previously, Marc Semo was head of the world section at Libération. A long-time reporter in Turkey, he has an in-depth knowledge of the Middle-East. Since 2016, he has been working for *Le Monde* to cover diplomatic news, and then to co-host the newspaper's ideas-debate pages as deputy editor.



**Nomi Bar-Yaacov** is a Research Associate in the International Security Program at Chatham House, an expert in diplomacy and the Middle East, an international human rights lawyer, an international negotiator and mediator with over twenty years' experience in mediating international conflicts.

#### **Round Table**

This round table will decipher the consequences of the war between Israel and Hamas, particularly for Israel's neighbors, as well as the risks of the conflict spreading to the regional scene. It will also analyze the consequences of the war in Ukraine on the Eastern Mediterranean, as well as the tensions between Turkey and Greece around the island of Cyprus, and address cross-cutting issues such as the delimitation of territorial waters and the status of Turkish straits, whose geostrategic importance has been brought back to the forefront of public debate since the outbreak of the war in Ukraine. In the Levant, the regional destabilization caused by the civil war in Syria and the gradual disengagement of the United States from the region have also given rise to new power policies from other part of states such as Russia, China, Iran and Turkey.

Nicolas Mazzucchi is Director of Research at the CESM (Center for Marine Strategic Studies). With a PhD in economic geography, he has spent over ten years in both academic and operational fields, focusing on energy, commodities and cyberstrategy.



Marc Delorme is Submarine Product Line Manager at Thales Underwater systems. He has held several positions in the French Navy, including commander of a nuclearpowered ballistic missile submarine.



Alain Fidani is Director of Partnerships and Innovation Financing within the EXAIL's Maritime Systems Division. Formerly, he has successively worked for Airbus, Cybernetix and Technip, where he was in charge of the development, marketing and commissioning of automatic and robotic systems.

#### **Round Table**

The seabed is currently undergoing an upheaval of two kinds. Firstly, new undersea technologies are making the seabed more accessible and exploitable every day, creating a growing strategic dimension in our modern world (undersea cables, biological and mineral resources, marine renewable energies). But the arrival of these technologies is also bringing new threats in terms of security, safety, heritage and environment to States. Another new factor is a growing environmental awareness linked to climate change and the loss of biodiversity. Against this backdrop, the international community is now questioning the environmental consequences of poorly controlled exploitation of the seabed, given the lack of scientific knowledge and the fragility of this environment.

#### **Round Table**

In the context of the war in Ukraine and, more broadly, the upheaval of the world order inherited from the Second World War, security and collective defence issues are playing an increasingly important role in European inter-state relations. Threats emerging at the eastern gateway to the continent are increasing the cohesion of States and influences public opinion : it highlights the strategic use of force especially as a tool for protection and as a strategic signal. More credible. Threats from areas bordering the Mediterranean basin, particularly on the south-eastern flank, add to those from Russian power and become additional matters of vigilance. In this context, the nations of southern Europe, and in particular their land-based components, are called upon to commit to anticipating potential crises and preparing collective responses.

**Maxime Audinet i**s a researcher on influence strategies at IRSEM, and an expert on Russia. He holds a PhD in Slavic Studies and Political Science from the University of Paris Nanterre.



**Blandine Chelini-Pont** is a Professor of Contemporary History at the University of Aix-Marseille and holds a doctorate in law. She is in charge of the law and religion section of the Law and Social Change Laboratory at the Faculty of Law and Political Science in Aixen-Provence.



**Nad'a Kovalčíková** is a Senior Analyst in charge of the Transnational Security Portfolio at the EU Institute for Security Studies (EUISS) and Project Director of the multi-million dollar EU-funded initiative "Countering Foreign Interference".

#### **Round Table**

Erected as a strategic priority and a new axis of conflict, influence corresponds to all the non-military strategies put in place by belligerents to influence conflicts, whether they concern them directly or not. "Hybrid warfare" therefore encompasses a whole range of techniques, methods and tools for achieving one's goals. The "war of influence" gives rise to a number of responses on the part of States, which are increasing their vigilance to these threats, and creating various structures, with the aim of adapting to these crucial issues. What are the concrete effects of this adaptation? How can we analyze and respond effectively to these new threats, at national, European and international level ?

#### Artificial intelligence and drones : challenges of the collaborative warfare



**Moderator : Philippe Gros is** a senior researcher at FRS. His work focuses on military issues, in particular military concepts and capabilities, and the methodology of strategic analysis and situation assessment.



**Nilza Amaral** is a programme manager of the International Security programme at Chatham House. Her areas of expertise include the conduct of war, including ethics and the transformation of warfare, with a particular focus on armed drones.



**Bruno Fichefeux** is Head of the Future Combat Air System (FCAS) programme at Airbus and was appointed member of the Airbus Defence and Space Executive Committee in January 2022. He has been leading the FCAS programme at Airbus since 2018.



**Cyril Lévy** is the Director of Drones and Autonomous and Collaborative Systems at Naval Group. In 2012, he took charge of the drone design and deployment programs assigned to Naval Group by the French Ministry of Defence.



**Loïc Rullière** is Head of the Deep and Tactical Strike sector within MBDA's Future Systems Division. He leads the team responsible for developing future weapons concepts for strikes and is involved in work to develop collaborative combat capabilities.

#### **Round Table**

Military operations are undergoing multiple transformations. Among these, collaborative combat considers much greater integration of the tactical actions of different units, platforms and even their munitions. This collaborative combat will involve a growing number of drone systems, the criticality of which is already foreshadowed by recent conflicts such as the war in Ukraine, in all fields (Unmanned Aerial / Surface / Undersea Systems). Artificial intelligence techniques will provide critical means to control these vast systems of systems, and to make these drone systems increasingly autonomous, which will not be without facing major challenges in terms of the trust to be placed in these devices. How do these different transformations fit together ? What are the operational, technological, industrial and ethical issues involved ?

Rear-Admiral (R) Jean-Michel Martinet is a researcher for the FMES' maritime department. He has had an operational career with surface forces, commanding three warships. He also commanded the Combined Task Force 150 in the Indian Ocean.

**Richard Watts** is the founder of HR Maritime, which provides professional services and bespoke training to the trade, shipping and trade finance sectors.

#### **Round Table**

The Red Sea is a transit area for almost 40% of the world's maritime trade, and a geopolitical axis under tension. Guarded and secured by Egypt near the Suez Canal, which it administers to the north, the Red Sea is locked off to the south by the Gulf of Aden, a strategic area regularly targeted by piracy in the Horn of Africa. At the same time, the Gulf of Aden is a strategic issue in the conflict between Saudi Arabia and the Houthis who are fighting forces loyal to President Hadi in Yemen. Across the strait, Djibouti occupies a key geostrategic position. The country alone was home to some six foreign military bases, attracted by its vantage point over the Horn of Africa, the Arabian Peninsula and the serious ongoing conflict in Yemen.

#### **Round Table**

The outbreak of the war in Ukraine on February 24, 2022 marks a return to high-intensity warfare on the European continent. This historic shift is synonymous with major upheavals for the defence industry. The so-called "offensive" weapons seem to have taken precedence over "defensive" weapons, particularly those mobilized in the context of counter-terrorism and guerrilla warfare that marked the 2000s in the African and Middle Eastern theaters. Do missiles still leave room for shields, drones and A2AD bubbles? What influence do defensive and offensive weapons have in the tactical balance, and what balance needs to be found between these technologies?

#### **Round Table**

The Mediterranean is both a place of exchange and sharing, as well as a sea that separates societies divergent in their economic, social, societal, cultural, and political models. This roundtable will address, from the perspective of youth, the challenging pursuit of a balance between solving common challenges, managing tensions between countries, and the need to respect identities and models, both in the North and the South. Faced with security challenges, geopolitical issues, and migratory movements, how can an agreement be reached despite disparities?

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
